# Support for Death Penalty in U.S. Surges After Boston Bombings

*Three-in-five Americans believe capital punishment is the preferable approach to punish convicted murderers.*

[NEW YORK – Apr. 29, 2013] – The proportion of Americans who favor capital punishment increased dramatically this month, a new Angus Reid Public Opinion poll has found.

In the online survey of a representative national sample of 1,008 American adults, 78 per cent of respondents (+8 since [September 2011](#)) support the possibility of prosecutors relying on the death penalty for murder cases in the United States.

The poll was conducted after the Boston Marathon bombings and concluded before the massive manhunt that resulted in the arrest of one of the suspects.

Respondents in the South (80%) and West (79%) are more likely to endorse capital punishment, along with supporters of the Republican Party (86%).

Most Americans who favor capital punishment think the penalty fits the crime in murder cases (68%), believe it saves taxpayers money and the costs associated with having murderers in prison (52%), and serves as a deterrent for potential murderers (also 52%).

Conversely, opponents of the death penalty are chiefly concerned about the possibility of executing a person who has been wrongly convicted (71%).

### KEY FINDINGS

- **78% (+8 since 2011) support the possibility of prosecutors relying on the death penalty for murder cases**
- **59% (+3) prefer the death penalty for convicted murderers; 25% (-2) choose life imprisonment**

*From April 15 to April 16, 2013, Angus Reid Public Opinion conducted an online survey among 1,008 American adults who are Springboard America panelists. The margin of error—which measures sampling variability—is +/- 3.1%. The results have been statistically weighted according to the most current education, age, gender and region Census data to ensure a sample representative of the entire adult population of the United States. Discrepancies in or between totals are due to rounding.*

When given two options to deal with convicted murderers, three-in-five Americans (59%) prefer the death penalty, while one-in-four (25%) would choose life imprisonment. Republicans (68%) are more likely to select capital punishment on this question than Independents (60%) and Democrats (49%).

A majority of Americans (64%) believe that the death penalty is sometimes appropriate, while 22 per cent deem it always appropriate. Only nine per cent of respondents think capital punishment is never appropriate.
